DEKATER, Mo., Dec. 24.—Harry McCullum, 21 years old, shot and killed his younger brother, Frederick, in the store's drug store here this afternoon.

The father, having grown old, retired from the active management of his affairs three years ago and turned them over to Harry.

Last night Frederick began drinking and continued until his conduct became so bad this afternoon that his father called the city marshal to take charge of him.

When the officer arrived the boy drew a revolver, having taken the time to load when he began lighting the lamp, when it flew up and struck the father's head.

When arrested, Harry said he had been running from Frederick ever since he was a boy. He had threatened to shoot him this afternoon and had run into the kitchen when the boy was in the back yard, but it did not seem to do any good.
