Tiburon Items

A more pitiful sight was never beheld in Tiburon than that seen at the pump-house baseball grounds last Sunday. The Lanagan-O'Connell Stars, managed by William Young, and strengthened by Billy Beyries, went down to defeat at the hands of the Corinthians. The old fellows tried their best, but they have lost their vitality; they are no match for the growing generation of the town. Before the beginning of the ninth inning a conference was called by the captain of the Stars in his effort to try and pull the old boys together and win. Justice Court Matters

Two John Doe warrants were sworn to by Celesto De Martini on Saturday in Judge Maguire's court. The warrants alleged that the said John Doe stole a door and when De Martini attempted to recover the same he was assailed by a tirade of vile names. The charges were petty larceny and disturbing the peace.

Two hilarious old parties were brought before Justice Maguire on Monday on a complaint by John Perry of the Gold Dust saloon who claimed that they entered his place and demanded fire water. As Perry thought they had a sufficient load of that commodity he supplied them with plain water. This so angered John Barrett, who acknowledged 73 years, that he smashed the lettered sign on the door and threatened like damages to Perry. Judge Maguire gave the sporty old party 30 days in the county jail. C. Martin, the companion, who was 75 years old, was allowed to depart by the judge after a warning not to be caught in such giddy young company again.

On Saturday the case of John F. Ponte came up in Justice Maguire's court and was settled by the payment of \$250 to John Leal the plaintiff. Also the case of the People vs. C. Zaro was on trial before a jury and the defendant was acquitted.

Two cases of the People vs. Frank Assin came up before Justice Maguire and a jury on Thursday. These were on account of the two John Doe warrants sworn to by Celesto De Martini on last Saturday. The complaints averred that the defendant stole a door from a house belonging to him in South Sausalito and that when the return of the door was demanded the defendant added insult to injury by heaping abuse upon him. The jury gave a verdict of not guilty and the defendant was discharged. Assin departed with the idea that he would next be accused of purloining hot stoves, live wires and bunches of rattlesnakes.

Dear Sir—The new summer ferry time schedule will soon be in force and it is sincerely hoped that the Railroad Company, in response to the petition of a great many regular commuters on the night ferry boats, will change the 9:15 leaving the city to 9:45 p. m.

The matter is now under consideration by the railroad and passengers on the 9:15 boat are being interviewed by company officials and so far this week a showing has been made in favor of the 9:45 boat in proportion of about 4 to 3. This proportion would be greatly improved if the passengers were interviewed on the 11:15 p. m. boat, since those unable to get the 9:15 p. m. are passengers on the 11:15 p. m. and a great many of these might have taken the 9:45 p. m. This 9:45 p. m. boat in preference to the 9:15 p. m. is greatly desired by all the night workers who use the boat regularly, also by business and professional men who desire to attend to business after hours, S. F. night school students and teachers, people attending churches and lectures, social functions, dinners or entertainments.

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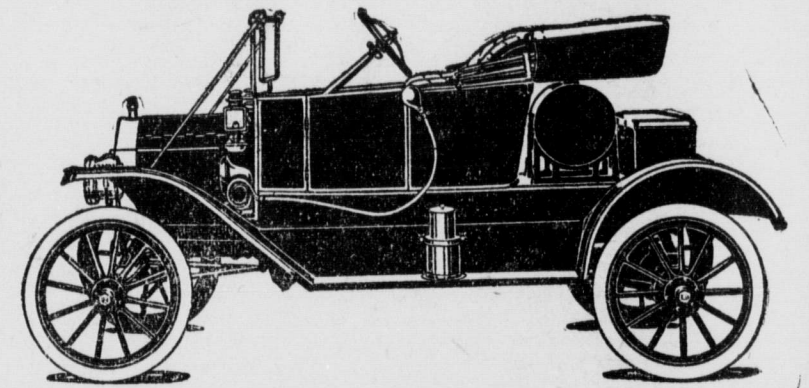
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
