

ASK ASSISTANCE OF FEDERAL COMMISSION

Panama-Pacific Directors Want Help in Selecting Site for Exposition.

The board of directors of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition held a lengthy meeting yesterday afternoon, at which all phases of the question of a site were discussed. It resulted in the sending of a telegram to President Taft asking him to request the presence and assistance of the Federal Fine Arts Commission in selecting a site. The commission consists of:

D. H. Burnham, Illinois, president; Frank E. Miller, New York, vice-president; Frederick Olmstead Jr., Thomas Hastings, Daniel C. French, Cass Gilbert, New York; Charles Moore, Michigan.

The telegram to President Taft is as follows:

"SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—To the President of the United States, Washington, D. C.: The board of directors of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition Company, in meeting today, adopted a resolution respectfully requesting you to invite the National Fine Arts Commission to come to this city at an early date to advise with them regarding the selection of the site for the exposition in 1915.
