Austria Must Define Stand on Submarines

Washington Makes Emphatic Demand on Foreign Minister for Statement of Policy to Be Pursued

LONDON, February 20.—Frederic C. Penfield, American Ambassador at Vienna, is said by Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent to have delivered to the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister a request for a clear and final definition of Austria-Hungary's attitude regarding submarine warfare.

The Amsterdam dispatch says that, according to a telegram from Vienna, Penfield handed an aide memoire today to the Foreign Minister requesting clear and final information as to what standpoint the Austro-Hungarian Government has assumed regarding submarine warfare.

Nevertheless the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Ministry declared in a note No. 49, of December 31, 1915: "As regards the principle set up in the very esteemed note that enemy private ships, provided they do not offer resistance, should not be destroyed."

ANCONA CASE IS PRECEDENT "Further, the Austro-Hungarian Government on the occasion of the sinking of the steamer Persia in January, 1916, declared that although not informed regarding this incident, it would be guided by the principles which it agreed in the Ancona affair, should events prove that responsibility falls on Austria-Hungary in this matter."

WASHINGTON IS IN DOUBT "From the foregoing it can be concluded that assurance given on the occasion of the Ancona case and renewed on the occasion of the discussion of the Persia case is in all material respects a precursor of assurance contained in the note of the German Government of May 4, which reads:

"In conformity with the general principles of international law concerning the holding of merchant and destruction of merchant ships, such ships will not be sunk either inside or outside that portion of the sea which has been declared a

LITTLE GIRL HAS THRILLING TRIP ON SUBMARINE

Taken Aboard When Father's Ship Is Sunk and Adopted as Mascot

COPENHAGEN (via London), February 20.—Solveig Jacobsen, the six-year-old daughter of a Norwegian shipmaster, who has arrived here with her parents on the way to Norway, has the distinction of not only being the first child to make a voyage on a German submarine, but of being the guest during the eight-day trip of the submarine commander, who is declared to have sunk the Lusitania.

DOGGING PATROL SHIPS The submarine limped homeward along a route west of Ireland and north of the Shetlands while dodging many British patrol ships and destroyers, and finally came into port at Heligoland in fairly good shape, the crew having succeeded in repairing the engine on the voyage.

Less Than One Ship in 100 Sunk, British Say

WASHINGTON, February 20.—The British Embassy issued a statement tonight announcing that Germany's "widely advertised campaign of ruthless murder on the high seas" resulted in the loss of less than one ship in 100 during the period between February 1 and 14.

(Continued from Page 1) Lloyd's reports cabled to the State Department by Consul-General Skinner at London includes the sinking of the British brigantine Netherton, 199 tons. The dispatch says it was the U-53, the German submarine which suddenly appeared at Newport last fall and later sank several ships of Nantucket, that sank the Netherton, the first American ship to be sent to the bottom after the beginning of Germany's new submarine warfare.

FIRST WORD OF WAR "When the submarine stopped us and sent a number of her crew aboard each broadside life-preserver with him," said the captain. "One of them laid his life-preserver down and I picked it up, slipping it under my coat. It is plainly marked 'U 53.' The first word he had, he said, that Germany had renewed unrestricted submarine warfare, was given him by the U-boat commander, who expressed regret at having to destroy his ship, and explaining that it was necessary as she was carrying food supplies for the enemies of his country."

SWEDEN RESENTS SINKING OF SHIP BRINGING NITRATE

Demand Made Upon Germany, as Swedish Farmers Face Fertilizer Famine

STOCKHOLM (via London), February 20, 8:20 P. M.—The Swedish Government has asked Berlin for particulars of the sinking of the Swedish steamer Hugo Hamilton, which became known here on Sunday through an official report from Berlin. The vessel, which was bought from the Norwegian owners, and was making her first trip under the Swedish flag was bringing 4000 tons of Chile saltpeter from Valparaiso, and was consigned to the Swedish Farmers' Association.

Gerard Leaves Paris; Consuls Quit Germany
